Unmaking Poverty

BRAC's economic and social empowerment programs equip individuals, particularly women, with the training, tools, support systems, access to finance, and confidence to start businesses. The result? They boost their incomes, build savings, and invest, uplifting their families and their communities in the process.



Building Resilience



In 2024, extreme heat and severe floods and monsoon rains ravaged communities in Bangladesh, impacting millions of people.

With your support, communities weathered these storms. BRAC teams orchestrated everything from water access during extreme heat waves to boat rescues and food deliveries when floods swallowed communities. They repaired broken tube wells and ruined homes, and helped farmers replant crops and restore livelihoods. Meanwhile, in Cox's Bazar, refugee children learned and played, while their parents accessed critical services and training in valuable life skills. Tens of thousands of community health workers also delivered lifesaving care door-todoor.

Unlocking Potential

BRAC's cradle-to-career education and youth approaches reached hundreds of thousands of young people.

BRAC's flagship early childhood development model, Play Labs, expanded playful learning opportunities to Sierra Leone and Philippines, joining existing programs in Bangladesh, Tanzania, and Uganda. In Afghanistan, a learning program taught girls excluded from formal education important skills like literacy, English, and computer skills. And in Africa, our youth empowerment program, which aims to reach more than a million young people in seven countries over five years, marked its second year, reaching more than 440,000 young people with skills and support.

Unmaking Poverty



BRAC helped millions of people unmake poverty.

Our microfinance program grew in eight countries. Accessible financial services reached millions of people-89% of whom were women-enabling them to invest in their businesses and families. BRAC continued to work with governments and partners to expand our flagship Graduation approach in places like India, Indonesia, Ethiopia, Rwanda, Philippines, and South Africa. In Afghanistan, a program to strengthen economic resilience reached nearly 20,000 internally displaced people and returnees with services or support. As a result, thousands of Afghan women received training and support to start home businesses in trades like tailoring, poultry farming, and beekeeping.











Grants by Country FY 2024








Revenue by Source FY 2024
